REFLECTIONS FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND CEO



El Centro ends its 44th year of operation, during what we could all describe as the most difficult year imaginable. We began our 2019-2020 fiscal year moving people forward by improving clients' health, wealth, education and overall quality of life (as planned) through informational, educational and integrative services and programming. As COVID-19 emerged, we shifted back to the basics, helping our community survive. The pandemic created demands for programs and services beyond our normal delivery and delivery methods. **Yet, we never stopped!**

The impact of this virus on our community exposed longstanding racial and ethnic inequities within institutional systems of education, health and economy. El Centro adapted, pivoting our resources to meet the immediate needs of our clients. We shifted to online, virtual classes, appointment only and utilized our Facebook page to communicate to our community. We strategically chose partners including Spanish language radio and TV to assist us in messaging, resources and promotion of activities, and education to meet the cultural and linguistic needs of our most vulnerable and essential workers. We also worked with our communities to amplify their voices as a strategy to begin changing policies and practices that lead to inequities.

As we enter a new fiscal year, we do this with an awareness that we are still in this crisis, and with much uncertainty. We are grateful for our donors and partners who offered flexibility in meeting grant requirements, expedited delivery of payments and provided much needed unrestricted dollars. Our goal moving forward is to sustain our work, while assisting clients in the safest way for all to remain healthy. We continue to seek support for families who will need time to recover from an event such as this. For many, economic supports were limited prior to COVID-19, the little they had now depleted. We acknowledge and recognize the long term work with our community is just beginning!

OUR COVID-19 RESPONSE









The COVID-19 pandemic deepened the economic and social disparities already impacting our Latino and immigrant communities in Kansas. We serve families most vulnerable to the economic, physical health and mental health repercussions of this pandemic. When COVID-19 struck we shifted and pivoted services and staff to meet some of the most basic needs in support of those most vulnerable including: food and rent/mortgage and utility assistance, child care, Pandemic EBT and SNAP application assistance, interpretation at our counties pop up COVID testing sites, creating a hotline to provide critical information and other resources needed to help protect our families.

HEALTH NAVIGATION

Increasing and improving access to quality, affordable healthcare services and coverage for our community.

Clients assisted with 3.318 services to access healthcare services

Direct Services provided – At a cost of \$135,000 to obtain emergency prescriptions, optical care, medical equipment, dental services, and diabetes testing supplies.

Billing Navigation services completed to individuals struggling with medical debt and billing issues.

Insurance Navigation services, enrolling families into healthcare coverage through KanCare, Medicare and the health insurance Marketplace and making sure they stay covered throughout the year.

Uninsured individuals were assisted in accessing surgeries, specialty appointments, medical interpretation and care coordination through our Specialty Care Navigation services

Public Services were received by families needing to apply for disability, Social Security benefits and other public benefits.

ADVOCACY & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

Developing leaders to build power and assist in creating policy changes.

Community Leaders trained as "Community Mobilizers" having skills to lead campaigns, organize, and aspire and advocate for others.

Latinos participated in Presentations such as the Know Your Rights, Public Charge, New Voter Information, Census 2020, and Power of Attorney workshops.

Community Outreach events with face-to-face communication with almost 1000 Latinos, using 750 volunteer hours and more than 500 volunteer hours on phone banking.

Latinos participated in nineteen clinics with an Attorney, using more than 500 volunteer hours.



ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

Strengthening the family through economic empowerment and assist in the creation of financial goals.

305 households benefited from emergency rent/mortgage and/or utility assistance which removed the crisis the family was experiencing and ensured a safe and stable home.

Individuals received one-on-one financial education over budgeting.

Household taxes were filed through our VITA services offering free tax preparation services to low income families.

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
